A new definition of statistical significance

Abstract

The classical definition of statistical significance is $p \le 0.05$, meaning a 1/20 chance the test statistic found is due to normal variation of the null hypothesis. This definition of statistical significance does not represent the likelihood that the alternative hypothesis is true. Hypothesis testing can be evaluated using a 2x2 table (shown below). Box "a" = true positives: $p \le 0.05$ and the alternative hypothesis is true. This is the study's power. A rule of thumb is that study power should be at least 80% (80% of the time the statistical test is positive when the alternative hypothesis is true). Therefore a = 0.80. Box "b" = false-positives: p < 0.05 but the alternative hypothesis is false. By definition, when p = 0.05 the test statistic has a 5% probability of occurring by chance when the null hypothesis is true. Therefore, p = 0.05 and the study's power is 80%.
